

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

WHAT IS SMALL GROUP MINISTRY?

Small Group Ministry is a group of 7–10 people who meet for a couple of hours usually twice a month to share personal life experiences and insights on monthly themes.

Facilitators of the groups are trained by and meet regularly. Each group also takes on a one-time service project. Members of the group can also minister to each other as difficult life circumstances arise.

SMALL GROUP MINISTRY GUIDELINES

- All members shall maintain full confidentiality; one may speak of one's own experiences and statements outside of the group, but not those of any other member of the group.
- ◆ Everyone is encouraged to contribute and each person's contribution is valued.
- Group members pledge to maintain a spirit of goodwill and openness to all other group members.
- Members will seek to speak from their own experience and refrain from judgments or analysis of others and from giving advice.
- If misunderstanding or discomfort should arise, members shall address it openly and work to resolve it within the group or seek the help of the facilitator or the minister in moving toward resolution.
- Each member will make a genuine effort to be present at all meetings, arrive and leave on time, and participate fully in conversations and activities of the group.
- Each group will include an empty chair to symbolize those not reached who need us and the expectation of helping start a new group as small group ministry grows at UUCM.
- ◆ The group will provide some direct service to the congregational community during the life of the group.
